PROBLEM GAMBLING

Where to go when you're looking for help



Whenever people take the chance of losing money or belongings, and when winning or losing is decided mostly by chance, it is gambling. There are many different ways to gamble, including buying lottery tickets; buying scratch, Nevada or pull-tab tickets; playing bingo; betting on cards, dice games or tile games such as dominoes and mahjong; playing slot machines and other casino games; sports betting; betting on video games; and online gambling.

When does gambling become a problem?

Problem gambling is not just about losing money. Gambling problems can affect a person's whole life. Gambling becomes a problem when it gets in the way of work, school or other activities; harms your mental or physical health; hurts you financially; damages your reputation; or causes problems with your family and friends. Gambling problems share many similarities with other addictions; however, there are no visible signs or physical changes that will indicate a gambling problem.

Getting help

Some people choose to stop all forms of gambling. Others may choose a harm reduction approach, which means they continue to gamble while developing some strategies that could reduce the harms of gambling, such as limiting the amount of time they play or stopping certain types of gambling that have caused the most problems.

In Ontario, free counselling is available to anyone affected by gambling, including family members. Call ConnexOntario at 1 866 531-2600 to get linked to the supports you need. An information and referral specialist will answer calls, e-mails or web chat 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Other types of supports include peer-based approaches such as Gamblers Anonymous (where you meet with others with gambling problems), outpatient and residential treatment. Treatment approaches include cognitive-behavioural therapy and mindfulness-based relapse prevention for problem gambling.
